BIOLOGICAL ACTIVITY

Description	Ondansetron- d_6 (hydrochloride) is the deuterium labeled Ondansetron hydrochloride[1]. Ondansetron hydrochloride is a serotonin 5-HT3 receptor antagonist used mainly as an antiemetic (to treat nausea and vomiting), often following chemotherapy[2][3][4][5][6][7].
In Vitro	Stable heavy isotopes of hydrogen, carbon, and other elements have been incorporated into drug molecules, largely as tracers for quantitation during the drug development process. Deuteration has gained attention because of its potential to affect the pharmacokinetic and metabolic profiles of drugs ^[1] . MCE has not independently confirmed the accuracy of these methods.
