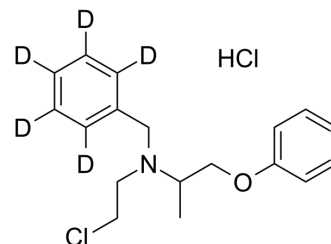

BIOLOGICAL ACTIVITY

Description	Phenoxybenzamine (benzyl-2,3,4,5,6-d5) hydrochloride is the deuterium labeled Phenoxybenzamine hydrochloride. Phenoxybenzamine hydrochloride is a nonselective, irreversible, orally active α -adrenoceptor antagonist that is commonly used for the research of hypertension, specifically caused by pheochromocytoma. Phenoxybenzamine hydrochloride also shows antitumor activity ^{[1][2][3]} .
In Vitro	Stable heavy isotopes of hydrogen, carbon, and other elements have been incorporated into drug molecules, largely as tracers for quantitation during the drug development process. Deuteration has gained attention because of its potential to affect the pharmacokinetic and metabolic profiles of drugs ^[1] . MCE has not independently confirmed the accuracy of these methods.
